METHODOLOGY:

The sample size for the survey is 500 likely voters and the margin of error is \pm 4.38%. The Interactive Voice Response (IVR) automated telephone survey was conducted June 29 – July 1, 2014 by Harper Polling for Partnership for a New American Economy. The total percentages for responses may not equal 100% due to rounding.
